Dear Public Service Director,

The health and wellbeing of our loved ones is paramount in households across the U.S. While we take steps every day to protect our family, such as buckling seatbelts, wearing helmets when riding bikes, applying sunscreen and even checking smoke detectors, there are just as many other risks that can be easily overlooked. Common pests found in our homes and communities can have harmful effects upon our health. Many of us don't often think of pests as a health threat and we may be unaware of the dangers that surround the areas where we live, work and play.

We've all been exposed to tick and mosquito bites. But are you aware of the increasing risk associated with these pests? **According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), disease cases from mosquito, tick and flea bites tripled in the U.S. from 2004 to 2016 – that's more than 640,000 cases – and nine new germs spread by bites from infected mosquitoes and ticks were discovered or introduced since 2004.**

Ticks hiding in tall grass can cause debilitating illnesses such as Lyme disease, Rocky Mountain spotted fever and can even cause tick paralysis. Mosquitoes lay eggs near standing water around our homes and continue to be a major threat to public health. Today, mosquito-borne disease epidemics happen more frequently, and local chikungunya and Zika virus outbreaks have now been reported inside the U.S. and its territories. Additionally, pests that infest our homes such as rodents or cockroaches spread harmful bacteria and disease and can also leave behind allergens that trigger asthma and allergy symptoms, especially in children.

Public awareness and education is critically needed to help prevent encounters with these public health pest threats. Your station can help educate viewers about the effects pests can have on our health by airing the new public service announcement (PSA), titled "**Safety First**" (:60, :30). This campaign is a joint effort from the National Pest Management Association (NPMA) and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). The PSA highlights common health risks associated with the presence of pests in and around our homes. The campaign has **no end date for use** and encourages listeners to learn more by visiting PestWorld.org.

The NPMA is a nonprofit organization committed to the protection of public health, food and property from the diseases and dangers posed by common household pests. NARRATOR V/O: YOU WORK HARD TO PROTECT YOUR FAMILY, BUT SOME RISKS ARE EASY TO MISS. MOSQUITO BITES CAN SPREAD GERMS THAT CAUSE WEST NILE VIRUS OR ZIKA VIRUS. Dear Applicant:

Based on information supplied, and assuming your operations will be as stated in your application for recognition of exemption, we have determined you are exempt from Federal income tax under section 501(a) of the Internal Revenue Code as an organization described in the section indicated above.

Unless specifically excepted, you are liable for taxes under the Federal Insurance Contributions Act (social security taxes) for each employee to whom you pay \$100 or more during a calendar year. And, unless excepted, you are also liable for tax under the Federal Unemployment Tax Act for each employee to whom you pay \$50 or more during a calendar quarter if, during the current or preceding calendar year, you had one or more employees at any time in each of 20 calendar weeks or you paid wages of \$1,500 or more in any calendar quarter. If you have any questions about excise, employment, or other Federal taxes, please address them to this office.

If your sources of support, or your purposes, character, or method of operation change, please let us know so we can consider the effect of the change on your exempt status. In the case of an amendment to your organizational document or bylaws, please send us a copy of the amended document or bylaws. Also, you should inform us of all changes in your name or address.

In the heading of this letter we have indicated whether you must file Form 990, Return of Organization Exempt From Income Tax. If Yes is indicated, you are required to file Form 990 only if your gross receipts each year are normally more than \$25,000. However, if you receive a Form 990 package in the mail, please file the return even if you do not exceed the gross receipts test. If you are not required to file, simply attach the label provided, check the box in the heading to indicate that your annual gross receipts are normally \$25,000 or less, and sign the return.

If a return is required, it must be filed by the 15th day of the fifth
