

Dear Public Service Director,

RSV (Respiratory Syncytial Virus) is a common respiratory virus that can infect people of all ages. Most people, including infants, develop only mild symptoms similar to that of a common cold including runny nose, fever, cough, decreased appetite or a sore throat. But for some children, RSV can be severe and even life threatening.

RSV is the most common cause of complications in children younger than 12 months of age in the United States. Children who were premature, have chronic lung or heart conditions, or weakened immune systems are at risk of severe disease from RSV infection. Trouble breathing or dehydration are the first signs of a more serious illness, which may lead to pneumonia or bronchiolitis. Additionally, one to two out of every 100 children younger than 6 months of age with RSV infection may need to be hospitalized.

The virus is highly contagious and with people taking fewer precautions as COVID-19 restrictions are lifted, RSV is spreading at an unusually high rate. While there is no vaccine yet to prevent RSV infection, scientists are working hard to develop one. In the meantime, it's important that parents learn how they can help prevent the spread of RSV and what to do if they're children begin to experience symptoms of the virus.
